GUIDE TO LIVING IN PARMA

BRIEF HISTORY

Parma, Ohio started out as farmland in the early 1800s, named after Parma, New York — and stayed a quiet rural village for over a century. But after World War II, the city exploded with growth as families settled into newly built neighborhoods.

By the 1950s and '60s, Parma became one of the largest suburbs in Ohio — a true symbol of the American dream with tree-lined streets, backyard barbecues, and a whole lot of hometown pride. Parma, Ohio, has a population of approximately 80,000, making it the seventh-largest city in the state.

Over the years, Parma has produced its fair share of local legends and claims to fame: Les Horvath, the first Ohio State Buckeye to win the Heisman Trophy, called Parma home.

Chef Boyardee (yes, the real guy!) lived in the area — and his famous food brand became a household name across the country.

And of course, Mike "The Miz" Mizanin, WWE superstar and reality TV icon, proudly reps Parma every chance he gets.

Add in a little national attention from Saturday Night Live skits back in the day, and Parma's earned its place as a working-class town with character, culture, and a sense of humor. Today, it's a mix of that old-school charm and new energy — where people still know their neighbors and take pride in being from "good ol' Parma."



COST OF LIVING

Parma, Ohio, offers a cost of living that's notably lower than the national average, making it an affordable place to reside. According to BestPlaces.net, Parma's overall cost of living index is 83, which is 17% lower than the U.S. average.


Housing: Housing is a significant factor in Parma's affordability. The median home cost is approximately \$177,200, which is about 47.6% less expensive than the national average of \$338,100.

Renatls: Renting is also more affordable; a two-bedroom unit averages \$1,070 per month, compared to the national average of \$1,430.

Utilities and Transportation: Utility costs in Parma are about 6.3% lower than the national average, while transportation expenses are approximately 16.1% less.

Groceries and Healthcare: Grocery prices are slightly lower than the national average, and healthcare services are about 11.3% less expensive.

In summary, Parma's cost of living is generally lower than both state and national averages, particularly in housing, utilities, transportation, and healthcare, contributing to its reputation as an affordable city.

Parma's mill rate in 2025 is 2.7%, falling below most suburbs around it like Middleburg Heights (2.75%), Parma Heights (2.82%), Seven Hills (2.86%)

Crime Statistics

Parma, OH is widely seen as a safe and comfortable place to live. Crime rates here are well below the national average — with a total crime score of just 11.63 compared to the U.S. average of 33.37. Both violent (5.14) and property (6.49) crime rates come in lower than national figures.

RECREATION

Parma boasts a robust parks and recreation system, with over a dozen city parks, play-grounds, athletic fields, and access to the Cleveland Metroparks. From walking trails and picnic areas to seasonal events and youth programs, there's something for everyone to enjoy year-round.

Best Parks & Recreation Areas

Nike Park: Small playground and exercise area along with a community pool plus softball and soccer fields.

Veterans Memorial Park, sometimes called State Road Park, has a long walking trail, play-ground, baseball fields, volleyball courts, frisbee disc golf course and borders Ridgewood Golf Course.

Proximity to Golf Courses

Ridgewood Golf Course is a Parma classic — open since 1925 and still going strong. It's a public 18-hole course with a mix of fun and challenge (watch out for that 615-yard par 5!). Big things are happening too: the city's building a brand-new clubhouse and event center, with golf simulators, a bar, patio, and more — all set to open by fall 2025, just in time for Ridgewood's 100th birthday.


Does the Neighborhood Have a Pool?
